

Diving Deeper: Scripture Study

Luke was a traveling companion of the Apostle Paul who witnessed the power for the Gospel to transform lives and communities firsthand. In his Gospel and the book of Acts, he wrote to show how God continually includes the other. Luke is a Gentile (not Jewish) who has been included himself and he wants us to see that the Gospel is far more inclusive than we could ever imagine! Join us as we study Luke on the weekends during weekly readings. May we rediscover Jesus and the radical inclusion of the Gospel.

Tips for Best Bible Study

If you're new to the Bible or need some helpful reminders:

Find a quiet space to study the Word. Open in prayer and ask God to reveal Himself to you. Read the passage as if you were reading it for the first time.

Observe what's happening in the text. Get the story straight and ask some classic journalist questions: Who, what, where, when? Try entering the story as one of the characters and imagine what it would have been like to live out the text. Pay specific attention to who is speaking, who the audience is and how they respond.

Ask questions about the things you found intriguing. Was anything confusing? See if the story gives you any clues or answers. Ask yourself why Luke would include a story, interaction, or explanation. What did Luke intend to tell the original readers of this Scripture? Why is this passage here?

Connect the passage to your own life. Once you understand more of why Luke wrote the text, think about his points and ask yourself how they might impact your own life. How is God speaking to you in this passage? What part of your life is connected to the core meaning? How are you experiencing what a person in the text is experiencing?

Spend time reflecting or journaling about your thoughts. Sometimes studying the Bible is easy and other times it's hard – focus on spending time with God in His Word and resist the urge to "have it all figured out." Close in prayer and ask God to continue to reveal Himself to you through the text throughout the day.

The Other: One of the themes that will continue to come up in the Gospel of Luke is the inclusion of the "other." Since Luke takes place in a different time and culture than ours, we wanted to give you some background information on who would be considered "other" during the time of the Gospel of Luke.

The Poor: those who live in shame of lack, not just financially.

The Hungry: those who hunger.

Women: those marginalized and abused because of sex and gender.

Children: the vulnerable.

Widows & Orphans: those who have been devastated by tragedy.

The Oppressed: those who have been hurt by the powerful

The Sick & Barren: those in pain

Demonically Oppressed: those with a dark and scary past who carry emotional scars.

Gentiles: racially non-Jewish and those considered foreigners outside God's love.

Roman Officials & Soldiers: those who were oppressors and enemies

Tax Collectors: those who have gone beyond redemption

Miscellaneous Sinners: those who are "stained" by sin, unworthy of grace.

 $\ensuremath{\textbf{Samaritans:}}$ those who were half-Jewish and half-Gentile and considered "half-breeds"
